

CONFISCATION OF PROPERTY



HEALTH UPDATE - HPV IMMUNISATION

HPV (Human Papillomavirus) is the collective name for a common group of viruses that can lead to genital warts and HPV related cancers. It can affect as many as four out of five people in their lifetime.

Many young people and their families are already aware there is an immunisation available. The immunisation has been offered to young girls for a number of years at intermediate school age, primarily to protect them against cervical cancer later in life. However, HPV can cause HPV related cancers in both women AND men. From January 1 this year, the HPV vaccine has been available free of charge for females AND males aged 9 to 26 years.

If you are a female and missed your HPV vaccination at intermediate school, or are a male and are interested in getting the HPV vaccination, your family doctor can provide this for you, free of charge.

As with any vaccination, it is important you base your decision to vaccinate on fact based, reputable information. I recommend you check out the Ministry of Health website and Immunisation Advisory Centre if you would like to consider the immunisation. Alternatively, I am happy to talk with you (confidentially) and answer any queries you may have.





Upon arriving, we took a second to absorb the scene in front of us; hordes of students hurrying about, making last minute fix-ups and modifications. Once finished, we left the equipment and returned home, eager for the coming weekend.

After an early start on Saturday morning, we raced back to Albany, not wanting to be a second late. After a general briefing, the

matches started. For these qualification rounds, each team was paired randomly with another team, and against two other teams. Our matches went well, and we finished the day in the 24th and 36th positions, out of the 70 teams competing. Carrying on to Sunday, the last of the qualification matches were held, and we managed to secure the 16th and 23rd places. This was a result we were very pleased with however, next up were the alliance matches. In these, the top 8 ranked teams pick two other teams with which they wish to compete with. As such, 24 teams get to move forward. Unfortunately, neither of our teams were picked, so our time was over. However, we all had a lot of fun, and enjoyed the experience of being able to compete in such a large competition. We all came away from the experience having learnt something new, and having made new friends.

LEARNER SUPPORT DEPARTMENT


On Thursday, 30 March, 196 students from 10 schools participated in the Central Auckland Special Olympics Athletics Day at Mt Smart Stadium.

UOSWF SGCNZ 9APRIL 2017 IN THE PAC

THE SHEILAH WINN FESTIVAL is being hosted this year by Botany Downs Secondary College. The festival has a long history and alumni of the festival will act as judges for our event at BDSC. We are fortunate to have three judges for the event which will take place in two sessions on the day 9.35am – 12.30pm and 1.30pm – 4pm. The festival takes place on Sunday 9 April 2017 from 9.15am where we will welcome all the schools involved in the festival with a Powhiri.

The performances which are 15 minutes and 5 minutes long are performed throughout the day and the entrance fee to the festival is \$10 for adults and \$5 for students and unwaged. The 15 minute performances can be wither student or adult led and each student taking place in the festival who is 15 years or over is eligible for the NSSP, which is a workshop for a week, where the students perform longer versions of Shakespearean texts. The students are then eligible to go to The Globe theatre in London for three weeks intensive in theatre training specifically in performance at the Globe.

We are hosting a number of schools from the Auckland South and East regions, who are presenting a range of performances from Shakespearean texts—The Merchant of Venice, As You Like It, Macbeth and King Lear to name just a few. All the 5 minute performances are student directed and the 15 minute pieces are either adult directed or joint directed by students. Every piece will be interpreted differently which adds to the enjoyment of the day as well as demonstrating how versatile Shakespearean texts are still 400 years after their writing.

Students from BDSC will also be supporting the performances in creative roles making and sewing for the performance event, Front

of House Roles, Liaison Roles, Lighting and Sound support, Runners and Backstage support. The event will be assisted by volunteer staff and it is a real joy for the performers to be well-supported by these individuals.

What can you BDSC community do to support this event? Do come to the PAC on 9 April 2017 at some point in the day. Entrance to the event can take place in between performances so you can come at any time to be part of the audience. If you cannot stay for the whole day that is fine, you pay one entrance fee and come and go as you can during the event. Our FOH ushers will look after you. Our NSSP student who will go to the Globe UK in July, who won direct entry to NSSP in 2016, Kaitlin Mahar, will also be helping on the day to support BDSC's efforts. 

Motu Moana Endeavour Camp 2017

On the bright and early morning of Tuesday 28 May, the Year 9 students and staff of Endeavour Whanau hauled their enormous cases of luggage into the commons, excited for a week filled with hands-on activity at Motu Moana Scout Camp. Students were then lead to the school tennis courts where they anxiously waited to be called into their camp groups, the group they would spend most of their camp time with. There were six groups in total, each consisting of seven or eight students and lead by a Year 12 or 13 whanau lead student. We then played a variety of team based mini-games to create a more tight knit relationship within the groups, and to encourage trust and friendship for the camp related challenges to come.

With some students already exhausted from running and shouting during the interactive mini-games, we loaded ourselves and all of our belongings onto the bus and set a course for Extreme Edge Rock Climbing in Panmure. After a thorough safety demonstration, we were let loose among the colourfully themed walls, each varying in difficulty. It soon became a challenge between friends; who could scale the toughest wall first? With the friendly competition and encouragement, many students who feared heights were able to take part as well. Then came the first team challenge. We had to get as many people from our group to reach the top of the higher walls- which required belaying and was far more difficult than the independent walls. Each team lined up for their turn, some more excited than others. The level of encouragement the students provided each other was truly uplifting, as many of them had hardly an introduction to each other prior to camp. Because of this, almost all students gave the wall their best shot, with many successfully reaching the top.

Finally, after a morning packed with activities, we left for the Motu Moana Scout Camp in Green Bay, arriving just in time for lunch. We were then allocated our cabins and walked around the camp grounds, buzzing with excitement as we got a glimpse of all the activities we would take part in the following days. After butter chicken for dinner and ice cream for desert (which was scoffed in a second due to the beautiful but sweltering weather) we gathered in the hall to recap the school's values, and how they would apply to camp life. We then launched into a trivia night where teams went head to head in guessing the names of popular songs from Mr Adams' personal favourites- some more difficult to guess than others. Winners were awarded points for their

However, the camp was not ever yet as we spent time at the Mt Albert Pools on the way back. We had ample time to have fun in the wave pools, go on the waterslide or relax in the spa.

On the way back to school, many of us only then began to feel the exhaustion catch up to us from the jam-packed week. Overall, the camp was extremely successful and students took away better teamwork skills, new friendships and many happy memories.
