The leadership opportunities at the College provide a powerful connection to positive self-esteem, role-modelling and the key competencies (collaboration, cooperation, problem solving and creative thinking) found in the New Zealand curriculum. Botany Downs Secondary College accepts the responsibility we have to give our students every opportunity to gain these skills and knowledge.

Leadership opportunities exist in every facet of life at the college. Leadership thrives in our entire infrastructure for example; Whanau committees, Student Councils, co-curricular programme and our Lead Student system. Our young people take the challenge to learn to lead.

The most important personal quality others look for and admire is credibility. This is your MANA which comes from what you do (actions), not what you say you do. If people don't trust then they won't believe the messages. People are often given titles but leadership is earned. It is not about personality or popularity, it's about behaviours. It is the challenge of moving beyond ordinary to extraordinary. Maintaining the status quo breeds mediocrity so we as an organisation must encourage our students to seize the initiative and make something meaningful happen.

Our students genuinely care about others so this behavious creates trustworthy relationships which in turn, enables group efforts to be sustainable.

People come together, creating an atmosphere where all can understand that they have a shared purpose. This process involves planning and goal setting and maximises the strengths of those in the team. Collaboration brings collective power to the group strengthening each other's resolve to get the best outcomes. Sharing information and knowledge freely within each group shows an understanding of others' needs and interests and distributing opportunities and power demonstrates others are trusted before you ask them to trust

Leaders set high standards and have high expectations for the groups and activities they are involved in. By paying attention, offering encouragement, personalizing appreciation and maintaining a positive outlook, student leaders stimulate, rekindle and focus other's energies on the tasks at hand. Encouragement should come in many forms and when it is in public, it signals that "we are in this together." Praise and thanks from the heart is authentic and builds that strong sense of collective identity and community spirit. Caring is the





SCHOLARSHIP SUCCESS FROM 2017

Last week The New Zealand Scholarship awards were announced. Scholarship provides recognition and a financial reward to elite academic students in New Zealand. Scholarship assessments are designed to be demanding and require students to demonstrate "high-level critical thinking, abstraction and generalisation, and to integrate, synthesise and apply knowledge, skills, understanding and ideas to complex situations." (www. nzqa.govt/qualifications).

In 2017 there were 18,714 Scholarship entries across all subjects. BDSC students accounted for 122 of these entries. Thirty of our Year 12 and 13 students secured 41 Scholarships and 5 Outstanding Scholarships. This represented a significant improvement on our 2016 results.

The table below provides a brief summary of the Scholarship awards gained by our students.

Each of these students have brought credit to themselves and to the College. Sincere thanks must go to the teachers who have run tutorials throughout the year, after school and during the school holidays, to ensure that students were well prepared. We will acknowledge these students and their teachers at our annual Scholarship Award ceremony during the July 2018 university break.

Approximately three per cent of students studying Level 3 subjects are awarded Scholarship. The table below gives a summary overview of the Scholarship awards available to students who meet the eligibility criteria:

Premier Award	 For the very top 5 to 10 candidates - achievement of at least three Scholarships at "outstanding" level in the same year \$10,000 per year for up to three years as long as the recipient maintains at least a "B" grade average each year of their tertiary study
Outstanding Scholarship Award	 • For the next 40-60 top Candidates - achievement of three Scholarships including at least two at "Outstanding" level in the same year, or more than three Scholarships including at least one at "outstanding" level in the same year • \$5,000 per year for up to three years as long as the recipient maintains at least a "B" grade average each year of their tertiary study.
Scholarship Award	 For Candidates who achieve Scholarship in three or more subjects in the same year \$2,000 per year for up to three years as long as the recipient maintains at least a "B" grade average each year of their tertiary study
Top Subject Scholar Award	 For the top Candidate in each one of the Scholarship subjects; \$2,000 per year for up to three years as long as the recipient maintains at least a "B" grade average each year of their tertiary study
Single Subject Awards	 For candidates who achieve Scholarship in one or more subjects; A one-off award of \$500 per subject, for up to two subjects (maximum payment \$1,000)

Most achievement standards based Level 3 subjects offer a Scholarship programme and students will be approached later this term or early in Term 2 regarding their participation in the programme. A positive attitude and commitment for the whole year are critical to ensure success. It would be wonderful to see the students of 2018 match or even surpass the superb standard set by our 2017 students.

MUMPS - TEENS AND YOUNG PEOPLE BEAR THE BURDEN OF LOW VACCINATION RATES

Welcome to 2018! With the holidays over and the school year well underway, I thought it timely to update our BDSC families about Auckland's Mumps outbreak and its effect on our young people.

Auckland has seen a dramatic increase in Mumps cases in 2017 and into 2018. As of 30th January 2018, 1134 confirmed and probable Mumps cases have occurred in Auckland. Many young people (whatever the reason may be) have not been vaccinated and are consequently the highest group of people affected. Most people recover from Mumps fully but in some cases, develop rare complications such as permanent loss of hearing, infertility and meningitis.

Despite most young people recovering fully, other non medical concerns occur. School aged children can not attend school if they have Mumps. This period away from school can be up to two weeks. This can cause huge disruption for families as well as loss of valuable learning while away from school, including isolation from friendship groups and normal teen activities while infectious (sports, hanging out with friends, part-time-job etc).

Our BDSC parents and caregivers can help support our young people and community by checking your child's vaccination status via your family doctor/practice nurse and seriously consider vaccination if they have not been vaccinated. The FREE vaccine (MMR) will also protect them against Rubella and Measles - two other serious diseases that young people are also at risk of contracting if not vaccinated. The decision to vaccinate should always be made with accurate, appropriate medical advice, so please speak to your family doctor or contact the agencies listed below.

If your child should exhibit the following symptoms, please contact your family doctor or Healthline for advice in 0800 611 116.

- pain in the jaw
- fever
- П headache
- swelling of the glands around the face

ENERGY Drinks



Botany Downs Secondary College has had a long-held expectation that high-sugar beverages, such as fizzy drinks, and beverages that are known as 'energy' drinks are not to be consumed on site. This includes 'soft drinks' (e.g. Coke), 'energy drinks' (e.g. V, Red Bull, NOS, Mother) and beverages such as sugary tea beverages (a recent trend). We also strongly encourage students not to consume these prior to the school day. We have noticed the increased incidence of these drinks being brought into College and the purchase and consumption of them on the way to College. We would like parents to reinforce and support this expectation. As these items are not expected on site we reserve the right to confiscate them (and return the item to students at the end of the day). We encourage students to maintain healthy hydration by having a water bottle, and these are allowed to be consumed in class.

There are multiple sources that discourage teenagers from drinking high-sugar and caffeine drinks, and how they do not provide either good nutrition or a state of mind that allows students to maintain attention to lessons. Time Magazine (see below) for instance states, "Energy drinks are popular among young teens and adults, but studies continue to show they may have unintended and potentially serious side effects, including high blood pressure, hyperactivity and more...accumulating evidence exists to suggest that energy drink consumption is linked to adverse cardiovascular events, sleep disturbances, and other substance use among adolescents".
